












BACK MATTER


Great Horn Owls - Ranging in size from 18 1 to 24.8 inches, these large owls are almost 4 to 5 times larger than Elf owls. They feed on predominantly small vertebrates and occasional insects. Their call consist typically of a series of hoots.


Barn owls - These owls are 2 to 3 times the height of Elf owls measuring 12 6 to 15 8 inches. They have a white ghost-like face and a loud screeching call. They feed predominantly on small rodents.


Elf Owls – The smallest of owls, measuring 5 inches in height. They are compared to the size of a sparrow. Considered not to be very aggressive, they feed on predominately insects and make curiously cute calls like meows, wolfs and chuckles. A notable, survival skill is playing dead. They are resourceful in nature and make their homes in recycled, wood, pecker, cactus holes.

Burrowing owls - They range in size from 7 to 11 inches. Burrowing in grasslands and deserts, they mostly feed on insects and small rodents
